

What makes studying at UWC different?

Our programme goes beyond traditional education. All 18 UWC schools offer a two-year experience, where 16-19 year-olds study and live together on campus.

We follow a rigorous academic curriculum, balanced with a rich and varied co-curricular programme in which students engage in creative, physical and service learning (e.g. volunteering).

Each UWC school has its own unique location and character, influenced by its host country, cultural context, local history and community. As a result, experiential and co-curricular activities might differ from school to school, as they make the most of their local environment.

Across UWC, students are deliberately selected from diverse backgrounds. This means that you will share your UWC experience with young people from very different socio-economic, religious, geographical and cultural backgrounds. You will learn with each other and from each other creating lifelong friendships around the globe.

Through academic, outdoor and experiential learning, residential life and student-led projects, our rigorous IB programme will inspire you to develop a sense of agency and possibility.

A UWC education will empower you to become an active global citizen, or a 'changemaker' - someone who has the skills, knowledge and understanding to make a positive impact on the world.

You will learn to connect learning and action, promoting peace and sustainability in everything you do.

A UWC education will transform your future and give you the foundation you need to make a difference, setting you up for success in whatever you decide to do.



Co-curricular activities

All students at UWC complete a co-curricular programme called Creativity, Activity and Service (CAS) - an integral part of the IB qualification.

Many of the CAS initiatives are proposed and run by students, with a staff supervisor for support and guidance when needed.

By promoting a collaborative approach, our students are inspired through values-based leadership, entrepreneurial thinking and community service.

The curriculum

A TEACHER'S PERSPECTIVE

"We ask students what the most important issues are to them, and what they can do to address them. For me, that's the biggest element of UWC. It's that sense of possibility."

Most 16–19-year-old students at UWC schools study the International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme (IBDP), a globally recognised, multi-disciplinary diploma. Made up of three core components and six subject groups, the curriculum aims to broaden students' educational experience and challenge them to apply their knowledge and skills.

The benefits of outdoor education

UWC students play the sports they have grown up loving, like football, basketball or tennis, for example. But they also get the chance to make full use of the environment around our schools, whether that means kayaking across beautiful lakes or hiking on snowy mountains.

We believe that activity and exercise are a crucial part of a well rounded school experience. But they also give students a chance to explore their surroundings, and truly experience the world around them.



CORE COMPONENTS

- **Theory of knowledge**, in which students reflect on the nature of knowledge and on how we know what we claim to know.
- The **extended essay**, which is an independent, self-directed piece of research, finishing with a 4,000-word paper.
- **Creativity, activity, service**, in which students complete a project related to those three concepts.





How do I apply to study at UWC?

There are two main ways to apply to study at UWC. Make sure you select the most appropriate route as you can only make one application per academic year.

1. Through your UWC national committee (NC)

UWC national committees (NCs) are groups of people - mostly volunteers - who represent UWC in more than 150 countries. They find and select local students, as they are best placed to understand individual applications and the potential of each individual applying.

If you need a scholarship, this is the right route for you. Scholarships are usually available for more than 80% of the students selected through our national committee system. These scholarships are allocated based on an individual student's needs and their family's financial circumstances.

When you apply through your UWC national committee, you apply to the UWC movement as a whole, rather than a specific school. This means you could study at any one of our 18 schools.

2. Through the UWC Global Selection Programme (GSP)

Most UWC schools also offer admission through the UWC Global Selection Programme (GSP).

Applications via the GSP are only available if students do not require financial assistance.

Through the GSP, students can apply for entry to a single school or up to five schools. This might be the right route for you if you are looking to attend a specific UWC school.

UWC fees and scholarships

Fees and costs vary depending on each UWC school, however, we believe that money should not be a barrier to education.

That's why we do things differently at UWC.

Those with the drive and compassion to change the world should be given the chance to shine. It doesn't matter where you come from or what your economic background is: what is important to us is your desire and potential to be a changemaker.

Thanks to our generous supporters, we are able to offer full or partial scholarships to many of these 16-19 year-old changemakers who need financial support.

To be considered for a scholarship, you need to apply via your national committee of residency or citizenship. If you are selected to attend a UWC school, the final costs of your attendance will be based on your needs and funds availability.

On average around 5% of our students in the IB Diploma years come from a refugee, displaced or persecuted background, and benefit from full scholarship provision.

If you don't need a scholarship, you can apply via your national committee or through the UWC Global Selection Programme (GSP).

Selection criteria

Our selection process varies from country to country. Each UWC national committee has its own application deadlines and tailors the process to reflect its own culture and community. This means they may add their own criteria, such as minimum grade requirements. However, whether you apply through your UWC national committee or the GSP, your application will be assessed based on the same six core criteria:



Intellectual curiosity

You love learning about the world around you - both inside and outside the classroom. You are able to recognise global and local issues, and analyse them critically.



Active commitment to your own values and those of UWC

You share UWC's values and show a commitment to follow UWC's code of conduct, both at school and in your daily life.



Social competence

You interact respectfully with others, understanding and appreciating their viewpoints and perspectives. You should be able to work within a team and collaborate to find solutions to problems.

Resilience, self-awareness and independence

You can look after yourself physically and emotionally during challenging situations, for example in a boarding school environment, in a foreign country, potentially speaking a different language.



Personal responsibility and integrity

You can express and examine your own values, and you are ready to contrast and reflect on them in comparison to the values of others.



Academic robustness

You have the potential to meet the rigorous demands of the International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme or the International Career-related Programme.

Life after UWC

Each student works with a guidance counsellor to explore their options and identify what they want to do next. That could involve going to university, setting up a charity or volunteering in their local community, taking a gap year, or something completely different.

Attending one of our schools also gives you access to one of the largest undergraduate scholarship programmes in the world. The Davis-UWC Scholars Program offers scholarships to a large number of US colleges and universities, including all eight Ivy League institutions.

Other UWC experiences

UWC also offers short courses, providing an intensive and immersive experience for students from 14 to 20 years old.

Lasting up to five weeks, these short courses offer everything that makes the UWC experience unique, but without the academic programme.

UWC short courses focus on a variety of different themes, including leadership, sustainability, migration, gender dialogue and conflict resolution.
